ADMISSIONS

Requirements

Graduation from secondary school required; GED accepted. General college-preparatory program recommended. 4 units of English, 4 units of mathematics, 4 units of science (including 1 unit of lab), 2 units of foreign language, 2 units of social studies, 1 unit of history, and 4 units of academic electives recommended. Portfolio required of art program applicants. Audition required of music and dance program applicants. Summer Incentive Program for applicants not normally admissible. SAT Reasoning or ACT required. No policy for SAT or ACT writing component. Campus visit recommended. Admissions interview required of some applicants. Off-campus interview may be arranged with an admissions representative. Admission may be deferred up to one year. Application fee \$35 (may be waived in cases of financial need), nonrefundable.

Basis for Candidate Selection

Academic: Standardized test scores very important. Secondary school record important. Recommendations and essay considered.

Admissions Procedure

Normal sequence: No application deadline. Notification of admission is sent on a rolling basis. No set date by which applicants must accept offer. \$200 room deposit, refundable until May 1. 4% of freshmen enter in terms other than fall. Admissions process is need-blind.

Transfers: Transfer students are accepted. In fall 2017, 4,407 transfer applications were received, 3,027 were accepted. Application deadline is rolling. Minimum 12 semester hours required to apply as a transfer. College transcript required. Minimum 2.0 college GPA required. Lowest course grade accepted is "C." Unlimited number of semester hours may be transferred. At least 60 semester hours must be completed at the school to earn an associate degree; 30 to earn a bachelor's degree.

International Students: 262 degree-seeking undergraduate students enrolled, 55 countries represented. Application deadline is May 1 for fall; October 1 for winter and spring; April 1 for summer.

Learning Disabled Students: Essay required. Support services available. Untimed standardized tests accepted. Lighter course load and additional time to complete degree permitted.

Placement Options: Placement may be granted for CLEP subject exams, military experience, life experience, and International Baccalaureate. Credit and placement may be granted for home school portfolio and challenge exams.

Freshman Class Profile

For fall 2017, 73% of 16,012 applicants were offered admission. 24% of those accepted matriculated.

Secondary school class rank of freshmen (fall 2017): 14% in the top tenth, 38% in the top quarter, 74% in the top half, 26% in the bottom half, 7% in the bottom quarter.

73% of freshmen submitted class rank.

Average secondary school GPA of freshmen (fall 2017): 3.31.

FINANCIAL

Expenses

Tuition (2017-18): \$12,594 per year (state residents), \$29,775 (out-of-state). Room: \$4,434. Board: \$4,910. Books/misc. expenses (school's estimate): \$3,018. (Tuition includes fees.)

Financial Aid

Needs analysis based on federal methodology. FAFSA: Accepted on a rolling basis. Notification of awards begins December 12. In 2016, the average aid package of full-time undergraduates with financial need was \$10,030; \$10,667 for full-time freshmen. 11% of students receiving financial aid participated in Federal Work-Study Program. 70% of 2016 graduates incurred an average debt of \$30,205. Of full-time undergraduates receiving need-based financial aid, an average of 47% of need was met.

Scholarships and Grants

Need-based Federal Pell, SEOG, state, college/university, private, and Federal Nursing scholarships/grants. Non-need-based state, academic merit, creative arts/performance, athletic, and ROTC scholarships/grants. Individual scholarship/grant packages range up to full tuition. On average, 426 non-need-based athletic scholarships are awarded with an average amount of \$20,270. In 2016, \$40,024,110 in need-based scholarships/grants and \$31,740,195 in non-need-based scholarships/grants was awarded.

Loans

Direct subsidized Stafford, direct unsubsidized Stafford, direct PLUS, Federal Nursing, and private/alternative loans. Institutional payment plan. Individual loan packages range from \$3,322 to \$3,908 (undergraduates); \$2,660 to \$2,773 (freshmen). In 2016, \$35,392,728 in need-based self-help aid was awarded, including \$34,110,120 in student loans.

External degree program. Cooperative education programs. Teacher certification in early childhood, elementary, middle/junior high, secondary, special, vo-tech, and bilingual/bicultural education and in 51 specific subject areas. Graduate programs offered; qualified undergraduates may take graduate-level classes. Many pre-professional programs. Combined B.A./M.A. and B.S. in occupational therapy/M.O.T. programs. Facilities

Academic Experience

72% of freshmen return for their sophomore year. Average GPA of freshmen after first year is 3.0 on a 4.0 scale. 44% of freshmen graduate within six years. The most popular majors among recent graduates were psychology, nursing, and liberal arts elementary teaching. 50% of graduates are employed in major field within six months.

GENERAL

Housing

All freshmen and sophomores must live on campus unless living with family. Coed dormitories and student apartments; sorority, fraternity, married student, disabled student, international student, cooperative, theme, wellness, and rental to sorority housing. 21% of all undergraduates (63% of all freshmen) live in school-owned/-operated/-affiliated housing.

Regulations and Policies

Alcohol permitted on campus for students of legal age; additional restrictions apply. Honor code. Hazing prohibited. All students may have cars on campus; 50% of students have cars.

Environment/Transportation

460-acre campus in Ypsilanti (population: 21,018), seven miles from Ann Arbor and 30 miles from Detroit; off-campus sites in Brighton, Detroit, Grand Rapids, Jackson, Livonia, Monroe, Traverse City, and in Washtenaw County. Served by bus; major airport serves Detroit; other airport serves Romulus (15 miles); train serves Ann Arbor. School operates transportation around campus. Public transportation serves campus.

Calendar

Semester system; classes begin in early September, early January, and early May. One summer session of 15 weeks. Orientation for new students held in September.
